

PANHANDLE ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY

Minutes of January 15, 2020



There were 10 persons in attendance.

PROGRAM: The program for the evening was "A Thousand Site Legacy: Digitizing PPHM Archeological Site Records" by Andy Burcham. Andy started with a brief discussion of the history of how the PPHM recorded sites starting in the 1950s. There are around 1000 sites not formally recorded with the state. His ultimate goal is to get these sites both in the museum database and recorded with the state. This is no small feat for him as there are 450 topo sheets for the twenty-six counties in the Texas Panhandle and two collections of these topo sheets that he has to look at to record the sites. He starts with digitizing the sites from a topo sheet onto TOPO!. He then compares these to the state records using Google Earth to see if the site already has a trinomial. Then compares how close the site is to a known trinomial using Excel to do computations using the distance formula. He is 42% completed with the county maps. He also shared some useful Google Earth "add-in" tools: USA Topo-Maps-Slider (slider that makes the satellite image go to topo map with varying degrees of transparency); USGS Quadrangles tool (lays out 7.5 quads over map and identifies them); and Soil Web tool (gives soil types for the area, if you click on the abbreviation it gives information on the soil type).

MINUTES: Rolla suggested a correction to the past meeting's minutes of changing Brett Cruise to Brett Bowsman. The minutes were then approved with this correction. Rolla motioned and Elaine seconded.

TREASURER'S REPORT: There is a total balance of \$7,356.37. \$4,000 of that came from our share of the TAS annual meeting and minus the amount given to the Studer Banquet speaker. Elaine motioned for this to be approved and Rolla seconded.

PUBLICATIONS REPORT: Rolla reported that there was a balance of \$2,441.97 in the regular account and in the CD there was \$5,239.20.

MARKETING: The Facebook has 103 likes. Twitter and Instagram accounts have been set up. The Instagram is Pan Arch Soc. The society has also been put on the list for the Prairie Palooza at Palo Duro Canyon.

OLD BUSINESS: There was no old business.

NEW BUSINESS: Southwest Federation is being hosted by the PAS at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum on April 4th. There needs to be a committee to do goodie bags – brochures and items like that. Paul and Rolla are taking care of abstracts and publication. Be thinking about who else can help with getting refreshments and stuff for give outs. Rolla suggested to waive the registration fee and for PAS to underwrite the fee of the meeting since we have the money to cover it. This would not cost more than \$500. Paul moved that we accept this idea. Elaine seconded, and the motion was approved by the members present.

Chris Podzemny came to talk about his recent find. He believes he found the burial of Sostenes l'Archevêque at the confluence of Sierrita de la Cruze Creek and the Canadian River. He wants to see if the PAS could help him, and to put up a historical marker up there.

The Flint Knapp in at Roaring Springs, Texas is January 24 - 25.

Alvin Lynn has been selected for the Curtis Tunnel Award from the Texas Historical Commission. This is the highest award you can receive for an archaeologist.

Paul motioned to adjourn the meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 8:25 p.m.

A Brief Review of Archaeological Work Conducted at Palo Duro Canyon State <u>Park</u>

Dr. Veronica Arias Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum

Abstract

Palo Duro Canyon has been an important place for human occupation within the Southern Plains for several millennia. There is archaeological evidence that its unique topography, fauna, and flora were attractive to different cultural groups throughout the past 12,000 years. This presentation will discuss the types of archaeological work conducted within Palo Duro Canyon State Park (PDCSP) since its inception in 1933. It reviews some of the highlights of the recently co-authored publication entitled History of Archeological Investigations at Palo Duro Canyon State Park (available for download at https://jtah.org). This research examined the various factors both within the discipline and in the broader arena of cultural resource management that have shaped both the amount and types of projects conducted at PDCSP over time. Finally, some of the preliminary findings of the 2019 Texas Archeological Society Field School held at PDCSP will be discussed. This latest field school has been the most intense effort to date to better understand the archaeology of the park and the rich history of human occupation in this region.

Biography

Veronica Arias has been involved in archeology and archeological projects for over twenty years. Most of her past work has been in the American Southwest and the Pre-Columbian Andes, although she has focused on the archeology of the Southern Plains since her arrival to West Texas A&M University in 2014. She is currently the Curator of Anthropology and Natural History at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, adjunct assistant professor of anthropology at the University of New Mexico, and the immediate past president of the Panhandle Archeological Society.
