

PANHANDLE ARCHEOLOGICAL SOCIETY



The meeting was called to order by President Erin Frigo shortly after 7 pm in the Amarillo Downtown Library.

There were 20 persons in attendance.

PROGRAM: Speaker for the evening was Dr. Veronica Arias, Curator of Anthropology and Natural History at PPHM, and past PAS President. The presentation topic was: "A Brief Review of Archeological Work Conducted at Palo Duro Canyon State Park."

Part I of the presentation was a Review of Archeological Projects from 1933-2018. Major segments in this period were: 1930's & 40's (early Archeological work, including projects with CCC crew labor), 1950's – 70's ("Outdoor Classroom" era, with the arrival of Dr. Jack Hughes), 1980's – 2000's (CRM & Permitted Projects – especially the Hughes sites Resurvey Project and the Red River Wars Project), 2010's – 2018 (Park Expansion & Compliance focus). PDCSP has grown to the current size of 27,128 acres, and now hosts over 400,000 visitors annually.

Part II of the presentation was a recap of the June, 2019 Field School - a joint project of TPWD and the Texas Archeological Society. 347 Participants were registered for this event, which had a primary focus of pedestrian field surveys to identify new Archeological sites within the Park. In addition, excavations were conducted at 6 sites: 4 Prehistoric (within the Park), 1 Prehistoric (on private property adjacent to the Park), 1 Historic, and 1 Salvage project. Other related projects included: an Ethnobotanical survey, a GeoArcheology study of the Park landforms, and a relocation of previously recorded Tecovas flint outcrops. Publications are pending for all this Field School work, and will appear in due time.

MINUTES: The minutes of the January, 2020 PAS Meeting were approved as published in the PASTIMES Newsletter.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer Pam Allison reported an account balance of \$7356.37.

PUBLICATIONS REPORT: On behalf of Rolla Shaller, Andy Burcham reported ending January, 2020 balances of \$2,379.16 in the Money Market Account, and \$5,239.20 in the Certificate of Deposit. The 180 day CD will mature and renew in February.

OLD BUSINESS:

Erin followed up on the February PASTIMES article to cultivate ideas and activities to grow our PAS organization. Idea & Activity sheets were collected from several members for discussion.

The following items were mentioned as ways to increase the visibility of PAS:

Chris Podzemny mentioned that qualified Cultural Resource Monitors are needed during trail building events at

Cross Bar Ranch and Paloduro Canyon State Park (this could be a good fit for PAS members)

Erin mentioned that custom PAS Tee-shirts or Hoodies could be printed up for our members

Discussions to refine the Ideas & Activities list will continue in future meetings. Erin encouraged all members to continue sending in their ideas.

Paul Katz spoke about the upcoming 56th Symposium of the Southwest Federation of Archaeological Societies, which will be hosted by PAS on April 4 at PPHM. Preparations are well underway, but Paul requested help from the PAS membership with several remaining tasks. A task list handout was distributed, and members could sign up to help. Plans for hosting the SWFAS Symposium will be finalized at the next PAS meeting.


NEW BUSINESS: No items of new business were raised.



This informal workshop will provide a basic introduction to the analysis of chipped stone tools and debitage or flakes, the by-product of lithic reduction. Given the time limitations of our meeting we will discuss raw material types commonly used by native peoples of the Southern Plains and their source locations, common chipped stone tool types found in the region, lithic reduction strategies, and the analysis and interpretation of chipped stone tools and debitage. This workshop will include a short video on flintknapping, lecture, and hands on analysis of chipped stone tools and debitage. During the latter we will work and learn together in small groups. Participants who own or have access to digital calipers and scales are encouraged to bring them.
